

## From Service to Success: Chris Markarian Inspires Veterans at Crafton Hills College Event



At Crafton Hills College's recent Veterans Day event, attendees gathered to honor CHC student military veterans for their resilience, dedication, and contributions. Chris Markarian, a local attorney and former Navy and Army servicemember who serves on the CHC Foundation board of directors captivated the audience with his inspiring life story and reflections on service, education, and opportunity.

Markarian's journey began in Iraq, growing up amidst challenging circumstances that ultimately propelled him to seek a new life in the United States. After the events of 9/11, he joined the Navy as a gas turbine systems electrician, later pivoting to cryptology due

to his unique language skills and cultural background. Markarian's expertise in Arabic, Farsi, and other languages proved invaluable, especially as he deployed during pivotal military actions in Iraq.

The experience of serving shaped Markarian's deep respect for American values. He spoke passionately about the importance of defending rights, especially for society's most vulnerable members, and reflected on how his time in the military illuminated the true meaning of service. This reverence for American principles, he explained, was a cornerstone of his dedication to veterans' rights and his legal career.

Transitioning to civilian life, Markarian pursued a career in law. He shared how his military training enabled him to earn multiple academic degrees, ultimately leading to a career where he continues to advocate for others. He highlighted the opportunities in higher education available to veterans, emphasizing the value of programs that award college credits for military experience.

In closing, Markarian offered practical advice on entrepreneurship, encouraging veterans to explore business ownership and government contracting programs that give priority to veteran-owned businesses. He also extended a personal invitation for veterans to connect with him for guidance, showing his commitment to supporting fellow servicemembers as they navigate their post-military careers.

As the event wrapped up, attendees left with renewed appreciation for veterans' sacrifices and the profound ways their service continues to enrich American society. Markarian's story underscored not only the possibilities of transformation but also the enduring spirit of those who serve.

Skulls, bones, and a complete skeleton (reproductions) were on display for the many visitors to the Anthropology open house on Thursday, November 7, in the new Anthropology classroom/lab in CHC's Central Complex. There was also

a spread of delicious Mexican food for lunch and a large birthday cake for "Lucy," the 3.3-million-year-old skeletal remains of what anthropologists recognize as evidence of one of the earliest human ancestors ever discovered. Her reproduced skeleton perched on a lab table for attendees to admire.


Professor Cheryl DiBartolo and part-time Anthropology faculty, staff and students were on hand to answer visitor questions and explain the display behind the glass doors of the many cabinets in this new facility. Attendees included faculty, CHC managers, and many students, including Anthropology alumni who now attend CSUSB.

Guest speaker Dr. Sang Hee-Lee, Anthropology professor from UC, Riverside used the lab's reproduced skulls and bones to explain the physical features that distinguish humans from other animals, such as apes and monkeys. She stressed that the first humans were not apes or monkeys that evolved into humans but a separate species.

Attendees got a glimpse of how well developed CHC's Anthropology program has become in offering a rich educational experience.

#### Crafton Hills College Achieves Top UC Admit Rates in the Inland Empire

# From Intern to Full-Time Employee: How Crafton Hills College's Internship Programs Opened Doors for One Roadrunner



Navigating the job market is never easy, but Crafton Hills College's Foundation provides financial assistance that helps Roadrunners like Nina Valenzuela find internships or jobs that fit their educational plans. This program enabled Valenzuela to work for three months, from March through June, as an intern for the City of Yucaipa, strengthening her skills in graphic design and helping promote the city's Performing Arts Center. Weeks later, she was asked if she'd like to join the team full-time as the city's social media marketing assistant. She did not hesitate to say "yes."

"I love it," said the 28-year-old Crafton student of her position. "I was just expecting an internship at the most and had three internships lined up after this one ended. But on the last day of work, they told me they were going to try to talk to the city of Yucaipa [manager] to see if there was room in the budget for me. I later got the call that if I wanted the position, it was mine. It was awesome."

Valenzuela worked closely with Pedro Chabolla, a regional job developer in Crafton's Career Services department. She said the application process from start to finish took about a week and a half to complete.

"Pedro helped me update my resume to a new format according to Al reading standards, and I literally live right around the corner from where I have to go into work," she said. "The speed in which he found a position that aligned with what degree—web development—I'm getting was so amazing."

Part of the perks Valenzuela gets to experience is witnessing the behind-the-scenes organization it takes to put on a show at the Performing Arts Center, including developing social media teasers of the Five Winds Country Music Festival.

# Crafton Hills College Honored for Excellence in Equitable Placement and Transfer-Level Math Success for Black Students



On November 13, the Campaign for College Opportunity announced that it has selected Crafton Hills College as one of the 20 California Community Colleges receiving its 2024 Excellence in Placement Award, recognizing institutions implementing AB 705 for equitable course placement. This law ensures students have

direct access to transfer-level courses in math and English, advancing their timely degree completion and transfer to a four-year university. It addresses long-standing barriers in transfer pathways, where required remedial courses had delayed student progress, disproportionately affecting Black and Latinx students.

Crafton Hills College, along with Cuyamaca College and College of the Canyons, was recognized as one of the top three community colleges in the state with the highest percentage of Black students completing transfer-level math within one year of initial enrollment. This equity designation reflects the college's commitment to dismantling barriers for Black and Latinx students and supporting their success through the AB 705 policy.

"Transfer-level classes are essential for timely graduation and student success," said Dr. Kevin Horan, President of Crafton Hills College. "Equitable placement policies like AB 705 empower students to progress without unnecessary barriers, allowing them to stay on track and achieve their educational goals."

Jessie Ryan, President of the Campaign for College Opportunity, noted that equitable placement is essential for ensuring students, especially from underserved communities, can meet their educational goals. This recognition highlights Crafton Hills College's commitment to student success and equitable education practices that support traditionally underrepresented groups on their paths to transfer and graduation.
