2024-2025 INTERSEGMENTAL GENERAL EDUCATION TRANSFER CURRICULUM (IGETC)

MET / IP / NEED	<p>Completion <i>and</i> certification of IGETC will permit a student to transfer from Crafton Hills College to a campus in the UC or CSU system without the need, after transfer, to take additional lower-division general education courses. All courses must be completed with a grade of “C” or better.</p> <p>CERTIFICATION: Current IGETC standards allow for full or partial certification. Partial certification is defined as completing all but two courses from any area except those listed in Areas 1 and 2. Students should request IGETC certification with Admissions & Records when requesting their final transcripts to be sent to the UC or CSU campus of their choice during the final term before transfer. NOTE for any students who begin at a California community college prior to Fall 2025: Students may present an IGETC certification beginning with the version current to when they began at a California Community College.</p> <p>CAUTION: IGETC may not be the best option for transfer, particularly for majors such as Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Computer Science, Engineering and Math. - 6E** Complete **one** of the following courses at Crafton Hills College: ASL 101(F21), 102, 103, 104, 105; JAPN 102, 103, 104; **SPAN 101(F24)**, 102, 103, 104
