Award Methodology

On November 14th, 2023, the Campaign for College Opportunity will honor colleges that have shown a commitment to the Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT), and will shine a particular spotlight on community colleges that are closing equity gaps as they support students to earn ADTs, as well as California State University (CSU) campuses that are enrolling transfer students on ADT pathways that guarantee the benefit of automatic junior standing upon transferring into a similar CSU program.

Following prior years' methodology, awards will be given to colleges that are graduating the most students with high ADT production and growth. This will include categories for:

- Number of ADTs awarded
- Growth in ADTs awarded over the previous year
- ADTs as a percentage of associate degrees awarded
- ADTs awarded per 50 full-time equivalent (FTE) students

Percentage Point Gap

To identify campuses that are closing equity gaps, the Campaign for College Opportunity is employing a Percentage Point Gap (PPG-1) methodology, where rates for subgroups are compared to a collegewide average of students who do not fall into that subgroup.

$$PPG_{\text{Black}} = \frac{\text{ADTs Black}}{\text{Associates Black}} - \frac{\text{ADTs NonBlack}}{\text{Associates NonBlack}}$$

For each college, we first calculated the share of associate-degree earners who earned ADTs for all non-Black students.¹ We then compared this to the share of Black associate-degree earners. Colleges where Black graduates are earning ADTs at rates exceeding the rest of the student body's rate will have a PPG_{Black} that is positive.

To be eligible for an award, colleges will have to meet each of the following benchmarks:

- Have awarded at least 10 ADTs to Black/Latinx students.
- Have a collegewide rate of ADT'S as a share of total Associates Degrees awarded of above 65%
- Have a positive PPG rate for Black/Latinx Students, meaning Black/Latinx graduates are earning ADTs at higher rates than the college-wide average of all other students.

California State Universities

As was the case in previous years, we have identified CSU campuses that have been successful at enrolling transfer students on guaranteed paths. To be eligible for these awards, campuses must meet the following criteria:²

1. Over 50% of their undergraduate transfers from California Community Colleges in the past year were ADT recipients
2. Of those ADT recipients, over 50% were enrolled on a guaranteed pathway

This methodology was used for all three CSU award categories, with the first category applying to all undergraduate transfers, and the latter two limited to Black and Latinx undergraduate transfers, respectively. Campuses are eligible for awards in multiple categories.
