

Spring 2024 Distance Ed Survey

Crafton Hills College conducted a student distance education survey in Spring 2024 to gain insights into the online course experience. The survey assessed various aspects of online learning, including course modality preferences, sufficiency of course offerings, ease of accomplishing tasks, helpfulness of support services, and barriers to online learning, along with demographic questions. A total of 412 valid responses were received. It's important to highlight that the survey is voluntary, both in terms of participation and responses to individual questions.

Key points highlighting recurring difficulties experienced with online courses.

- **Canvas Navigation:**
 - Challenges in finding due dates, which sometimes do not match what is shown on Canvas.
 - Difficulty navigating self-serve after changes were made.
 - Difficulty understanding coursework due to unclear instructions or changes in syllabus dates without prior notice.
 - Inconsistent assignment locations across Canvas, with some assignments under "Assignments," others under "Modules," and more under "Home."
 - Instructors setting up Canvas differently, causing confusion in locating assignments, modules, and home content.
 - Issues with locating course materials and grades, particularly after courses have ended.
 - Struggles with uploading assignments, such as converting Google Docs to PDFs or specific formats required by professors.

- **Communication Delays:**

- Delayed responses from professors, sometimes taking two to three days or longer.
- Lack of feedback on quizzes and assignments, making it hard for students to focus on improvement.

- **Technical Issues:**

- Challenges with using GoReact especially for feedback on Canvas.
- Library's lack of access to Adobe products, such as Photoshop.
- Technical challenges related to understanding and navigating Canvas, like emailing and assignment uploads.
- Wi-Fi or connection issues interrupting access to online learning.

Difficult Experience
Every teacher sets up Canvas differently, and that makes it difficult. Sometimes assignments are under Assignments, sometimes under Modules, sometimes under Home.
Finding due dates as sometimes they are inconsistent with what's shown on Canvas.
Getting ahold of any of my professors in general; two or threeday responses back are too long.
GoReact for ASL on Canvas is difficult to go back and look at feedback.
Had some difficulties regarding the new updated web advisor.
I didn't get to see scores on some of my quizzes; this was hard for me since I couldn't focus on improving in that section.
I feel that locating where to speak to my professor was easy; it was mainly getting the professor to respond to messages that I found difficult.
I had a hard time figuring out all the assignments that were due and when.
I had a hard time locating the Statistics class book for the assignments. When I finally found it, I was almost two weeks behind.
I had a somewhat difficult experience trying to locate my grades after a course ends.
I had one class that stopped showing my assignment due dates on my Canvas calendar. I couldn't figure out why this happened.
I'm having a difficult time understanding the coursework that's provided because she posts different dates than what the syllabus states. I am aware she is allowed to change what's on the syllabus, but she doesn't tell us beforehand.
Instructors are rarely available.
It is difficult to understand the Canvas mainly because the teachers do not make the instructions clear.
It was a little tricky to figure out how to email the professors.
Locating where course materials were.
Look for grades and also deadlines for all the assignments.
Many assignments were to be done in 2 parts, that had 2 different due dates. There were no notifications for the first due dates.
Messaging other students through discussion boards.
My instructor was extremely difficult to get in contact with and gave very little guidance regarding details needed for assignments or how she used Canvas to navigate the course. By the time she would respond to emails, it was already after the assignment was due, and her responses were still vague and not very helpful.
Only difficulties were accessing the discussion board. It was a lot of clicking around to get to the discussion boards.
Some professors format their modules very weird, and it makes it very difficult to follow, especially when they don't make an announcement or module showing us how to access the work.
Sometimes the assignments are located in too many different places, making it challenging to ensure all assignments are completed. Communication with instructors is expected via email or pronto.
The only trouble I had was learning how to navigate the selfserve when it changed.
Understanding why my grades change overnight and don't make sense sometimes.

Key points below highlight the recurring challenges students face with online learning.

- **Communication Challenges:**

- Students frequently mention the difficulty of getting timely responses from their professors.
- Students mention that communication about course details, instructions, and feedback is often unclear or insufficient.

- **Canvas Navigation and Technical Issues:**

- Converting files or dealing with online textbooks that don't function well.
- Course design; too many links causing confusion and distraction.
- Frequent problems with WiFi connectivity
- Instructors not clearly laying out assignments or uploading broken links.
- Issues with finding assignments, notifications not being received despite settings, and required discussions not showing up on the dashboard.
- Lack enough course content; lecture notes, and recorded videos to fully grasp the material.
- Required discussions not shown in the Todo list on the dashboard.
- Requiring discussion posts by Wednesday for homework assigned on Monday.
- Students struggled to engage in language or visually oriented subjects due to the lack of direct practice.
- Some professors struggle with

- **Engagement and Interaction:**

- Students commonly reported difficulties with real-time communication, connecting with classmates, and staying motivated.

What is the most challenging part of online learning? (n=201)
Communication (40)
A lot of professors do not understand technology and it gets in the way of learning
Access to instructors, they never respond to you
Been pretty easy. Sometimes getting a hold of one of my instructors was difficult
Challenging part is sometimes getting into contact with your professor. There are some who respond quickly and some who don't, which is hard, but they try their best to respond as soon as possible

Communication with some teachers
For me, the biggest challenge can be getting a response from instructors. This is obviously case by case. I have had instructors keep in communication throughout the class and get back to me when I reach out for questions. But I have also had classes (sociology last summer) where I reached out to my instructor via canvas, personal email, and their school email weekly, asking for feedback on my assignments, and not once received any responses. And no assignments were graded until after the entire class ended. So until after the last day of class, I still had no idea how I was doing, which was extremely stressful
Getting help right away
Getting in contact with teachers when they lock assignments
GETTING INSTRUCTORS TO ANSWER YOU
Having no one-on-one connection with the professor and glitches in the system
Having to self-study the course. For asynchronous courses, there is no instructor to teach the course material, so building knowledge is all up to the student. It is also difficult to stay engaged and motivated for a course that is online versus one in person
I found that getting in contact with my professors was really difficult as some would not respond for months
I have found online classes to be easy to navigate and have not had any difficulties, but I guess the challenge is waiting for a reply from a professor if I have any questions
I think it is challenging to feel a personal connection with the professor. Other than that, I love online courses and don't find a problem with learning the material
Inability to instantly ask questions of Professor. I prefer on-campus for this reason
It's hard to directly ask questions because it's not in real-time
Lack of communication regarding details not covered in syllabus or assigned work. A lot of detail just comes from trial and error, which leads to late submissions and a lack of confidence in assignments turned in. No feedback on grades or tests either
Lack of communication, instructions are sometimes worded in a confusing manner
Lack of in-depth instruction and lack of Q&A sections
Not being able to ask a question and have it answered till email is viewed
Not being able to ask questions right away or receive answers if I'm stuck
Not being able to ask the professor a question in the class and get an answer right then
Not being able to communicate with peers and listen to their respective thoughts about a subject matter
Not being able to just raise my hand and get an instant answer
Not being able to speak to the professor directly
Not having a teacher to help with immediate questions
Not having enough face-to-face time with the instructor and class
Not having the live interaction of asking questions and receiving detailed responses
Not having the teacher reply right away

A better-to-better online learning experience would be if professors didn't give zeros on assignments just because a student referred to them as professor instead of doctor because they are college professors.

Overall, the key themes and relevant points identified from the survey are as follows:

- **Communication Issues:** There is a consistent challenge with timely and clear communication from professors. Students struggle with delayed responses, lack of feedback, and unclear instructions.
 - Delayed responses, sometimes taking two to three days or longer.
 - Lack of feedback on quizzes and assignments, making it hard for students to focus on improvement.
 - Professors should offer live office hours, especially for asynchronous classes, and provide timely feedback and help.
 - Students mention that communication about course details, instructions, and feedback is often unclear or insufficient.
- **Technical and Navigational Difficulties:** Many students face issues with navigating Canvas, dealing with technical problems, and accessing necessary resources like Zoom links, tech help, and course materials. There is also a need for better support and training for professors in using these tools effectively.
 - Better access to technology, such as Office 365 in Canvas.
 - Challenges with using GoReact especially for feedback on Canvas.
 - Difficulty navigating self-serve after changes were made.

- Availability of laptops, and hotspots.
 - Library's lack of access to Adobe products, such as Photoshop.
 - Parking lot WiFi and campus access on weekends
 - Technical challenges related to understanding and navigating Canvas, like emailing and assignment uploads.
- **Inconsistent Course Structure:** The variability in how courses are structured on Canvas creates confusion for students. There is a clear call for more standardized course layouts and consistent use of Canvas features by instructors.
 - Assignments should be provided at the beginning of the week with flexibility on submission.
 - Challenges in finding due dates, which sometimes do not match what is shown on Canvas.
 - Course design; too many links causing confusion and distraction.
 - Courses should include recorded lectures to aid in understanding material.
 - Difficulty understanding coursework due to unclear instructions or changes in syllabus dates without prior notice.
 - Implement a system to send out notifications to students for due dates, similar to Google Classroom.
 - Inconsistent assignment locations across Canvas, with some assignments under "Assignments," others under "Modules," and more under "Home."
 - Assignments are not clearly laid out, and have broken links
 - Issues with finding assignments, notifications not being received despite settings, and required discussions not showing up on the dashboard.
 - Issues with locating course materials and grades, particularly after courses have ended.
 - More flexible due dates and the ability to unlock courses for students to work at their own pace.
 - More opportunities for students to connect online for support and study groups.
 - Required discussions not shown in the Todo list on the dashboard.
 - Requiring discussion posts by Wednesday for homework assigned on Monday.
 - Struggles with uploading assignments, such as converting Google Docs to PDFs or specific formats required by professors.
 - Students struggled to engage in language or visually oriented subjects due to the lack of direct practice.
 - The absence of multimedia resources, like videos, made it harder for students to understand assignments and course content.
 - Workshops and activities should be provided to engage online students more fully.
 - **Engagement and Interaction:** Students express a need for more interactive and engaging online learning experiences, including real-time communication with peers and instructors, as well as more accessible and flexible course content.
 - Students commonly reported difficulties with real-time communication, connecting with classmates, and staying motivated.
 - **Work-Life Balance Challenges:** Many students are balancing online learning with other responsibilities, such as caregiving and work, which is compounded by inconsistent communication and inflexible course structures.
 - Balancing online learning with caregiving duties, particularly for those with young children or other dependents, was a significant barrier.
 - Inadequate housing and a lack of quiet, dedicated space for studying were frequently mentioned as obstacles to effective online learning.
 - Unreliable WiFi or internet connections at home.
